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



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
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#### Why did you choose an iD Tech **Summer Camp?**

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# A SUMMER PROGRAM



usiness, communication, politics and economics are all becoming increasingly international, requiring a global perspective to better understand other cultures and countries. Studying at a U.S. university or college is one way you can broaden your cultural understanding.

Each year, hundreds of thousands of students from around the world come to study at U.S. universities and colleges. Some students spend four years working toward a bachelor's degree, while others remain longer in order to attend graduate or professional school.

Another option, which requires less time away from home and is considerably less expensive, is to study in America during the summer.

Most U.S. summer programs take place between May and August, and last anywhere from two to twelve weeks. In this short period of time, you will have abundant opportunities to improve your English skills, learn about U.S. culture, politics and customs, and visit different parts of the country.

#### Who Studies During the Summer

If you do choose a summer program, you will have plenty of company. Traditionally, most U.S. university students do not attend classes fulltime during the summer. Instead, they usually spend these months traveling, vacationing, or working in order to save money for the following year's tuition.

However, this has been changing. Many universities now offer a wide variety of courses during the summer. In many instances, students may take as many classes as they would during any other term. You will be sharing the campus with many U.S. students and international visitors.

#### Where to Study

Your study experience in the USA can extend beyond textbooks and the people you meet. Summers are an excellent time to travel and explore other areas of the country. Although the United States is a large country, you can easily plan trips to cities and sites beyond the campus where you take classes. Consequently, you may want to attend a program or university that is located in a region of the country that especially appeals to you.


#### Where can you imagine yourself? Where have you always wanted to go?

WEST: West Coast cities, such as Los Angeles, Santa Barbara, San Diego and San Francisco offer dozens of fine summer study programs. Magnificent mountain and river views abound from campuses in Washington and Oregon. There are spectacular desert locations in Arizona and New Mexico. The mountainous settings of Colorado, Montana, and Utah offer more opportunities for learning.

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MIDWEST: What about beautiful lake regions in Wisconsin and Minnesota, and large urban settings in Michigan? The bustling Midwest city of Chicago offers a number of fine study options. And there are sprawling campuses in places like Indiana and Ohio.

SOUIHEASI: Along the southeastern coast, you can choose from schools in Florida, Virginia and Maryland, or in the great capital city of Washington, D.C. NORTHEAST: The northeastern section includes settings in the hills and towns of New England, and urban universities in Boston, Philadelphia and New York.

#### What to Study

Most often, the same amount of academic credit is awarded for a class no matter when it is offered. The only significant difference is the schedule. Because summer term is shorter than fall, winter and spring terms, summer classes are condensed. You will learn the same material; the lecture may just be longer. Depending on your perspective, this can be a very efficient form of study. Students often select classes that will complement their current academic program of study, while others choose classes out of curiosity or for fun.

In addition to the regular course offerings for the arts, sciences, and humanities, you will find a wide variety of classes during the summer: special intensive classes taught by visiting scholars; workshops that combine study and field trips; scientific research opportunities; and courses offered especially for non-degree candidates.

#### **English Language Programs**

If you are not a native speaker of English, there is no better way to improve your language skills than to spend a few months at a U.S. university. Before selecting a program, ask yourself if your English is adequate enough for you to understand university lectures given entirely in English. Is it good enough for you to participate in class discussions ... to prepare class assignments ... to take regular written examinations?

Depending on your language abilities, you may want to enroll in an intensive English language program that combines English study with academic courses. Or, you may simply need to supplement your academic studies with an English as a Second Language (ESL) course.

Many schools do not require a TOEFL

score as part of the enrollment process. In such cases, you may want to check with the summer program office to find out the criteria they use for accepting non-native English speakers.

#### **Contacting Programs**

Many schools do not require a formal admissions process for their summer programs, as opposed to their regular academic-year programs. If you are applying only for the summer and do not intend to study for a degree, the admissions process is typically simpler.

To begin the process of applying to a program, write directly to the summer sessions office of each school that interests you. If you use email, please indicate that you learned about the program from Summer Study in the USA® magazine.

Ask for a catalog of summer session courses, an application and housing information. Most information is available by February or March. In addition, this type of information is typically available on the institution's website.

As part of your application process, be sure to determine whether you will need a visa to study in the United States during the summer. (If you qualify based on their regulations, U.S. universities provide the Certificate of Eligibility—formerly known as an I-20—for you to take to the U.S. embassy for visa processing.)

If you do require a visa, be sure to allow enough time for the embassy to process it and return it to you before your departure date. (Because of recent regulations put in place by the Department of Homeland Security, in recent years, visa processing is taking longer than ever before.) Some embassies require appointments and charge a fee for such processing. More information about visas and embassy requirements in particular countries can be found at https://travel.state.gov/content/visas/en/study-exchange.html.

You can also find information about U.S. summer and full-time academic programs at your local educational advising center. There, trained advisors can help you select a summer program. In addition, many education and study abroad professionals have offices in major cities in Europe and Asia.

No matter what courses you choose or which university you attend, visiting the USA through a summer study program is a rewarding experience that you will never forget. 🗘

#### Do You Want to Study in the USA this Summer?

Summer is a wonderful time to further your studies and explore the United States. With the proper planning you will have an exciting and rewarding experience studying abroad in America!

#### How Can I Afford It?

Spending a summer studying abroad in the USA can be one of the most challenging and rewarding experiences of your life. Much is to be gained from the people you meet, the events you experience, and the lessons you learn. The memories you make during one summer in America can be some of the best in your life!

As an international student studying in the summer, you can experience the U.S. education system in very different ways than you would during the regular academic year. Often times, you will find summer study abroad programs to be more relaxed than semester or year programs, allowing you to more fully experience American culture!

If you carefully choose the location and school, you can combine the best features of a foreign holiday with actual study. You can improve your English language fluency, gain new professional skills and deepen your understanding of life in the USA.

International students can do all this for an affordable price. The cost of attending summer school in the United States is low compared with the cost of studying for a full year. Also, even if it is for just a summer, your U.S. education is an investment that will reward you all your life.

#### **Cost of Summer Programs**

The amount you spend will depend mainly upon how long you study in the U.S. Summer sessions are usually between 4 and 12 weeks long.

You can find updated information on the cost and length of summer courses on a university or college program's website and in their catalog. Go to the "Contact us" form on the school's profile page at StudyUSA.com. Write directly to the summer session



office or English language program of each school that interests you, and please mention Study in the USA when you write.

It is difficult to estimate average total expenses for summer study in the U.S. because the cost of tuition and fees varies greatly from school to school. One program may include total cost from start to finish, while another has a lower fee, but charges separately for meals, accommodations, etc. To make your own comparisons, here are some of the costs to expect.

#### APPLICATION FEE:

When you apply to study in a summer program, you will send an application fee along with your application. This non-refundable application fee can range from US\$30 to US\$75. Most institutions accept credit cards, or you can pay by check or money transfer.

Admission to some summer programs is selective. You may be asked to send copies of your grades (marks) from the school or university you last attended. If your native language is not English, you also may be asked to supply your TOEFL or IELTS score. If your TOEFL or IELTS score is below a certain level, the school may refer you to the English language program, or you may have to take an English language placement test when you arrive.

Not all U.S. institutions require the TOEFL or IELTS exam from international students. Community colleges often do not require the TOEFL or IELTS exam. Students who aren't especially confident with their English should consider a summer intensive English program or beginning their studies at a summer community college program.

#### TUITION:

Costs of summer programs vary so much from program to program and school to school that any average price would be misleading. The quality of a program does not depend upon its cost. You will consider cost in choosing a program, but the education, experience, personal attention, facilities, geographical location, opportunities to participate in activities and excursions with other students are all important factors that should determine your final decision. Prioritize what is most important to you, and start searching

for the perfect match to start your exciting summer adventure in the USA!

Similarly, there is no typical or average price for English language programs. Important factors to consider are accreditation, university and TOEFL preparation, class size, hours of instruction, and what workshops, activities or services are included with the tuition.

#### HEALTH SERVICE AND INSURANCE:

Most summer programs charge a health service fee of about US\$50 to US\$80. For this fee, students can use the school clinic for treatment of minor injuries and illnesses.

Because U.S. medical costs are extremely high, you should also purchase health and accident insurance if the program does not offer an insurance plan to their students. Many schools may require you to have health insurance regardless. Factor this into your budget.

Write the school's international student advisor or ask the academic counselor in your country about health insurance plans and options before you go to the USA. Also, always check to find out what the school requires.

#### OTHER FEES:

You will pay special fees if you use a science laboratory, fine arts studio or athletic facilities.

#### ROOM AND BOARD:

You can live in a residence hall during the summer at most U.S. universities and colleges, although many community colleges do not provide housing, so plan accordingly. Rooms on campus usually are available to summer program students who want them.

Most schools offer a room and board payment plan. In this case, you would pay for both your room and your cafeteria or dining hall meals. You may also buy food at the school's cafés or campus center. Many campuses now offer a variety of food and café options, in additions to the cafeteria. An advantage to living in the dorms is that lower rent in dorm accommodations often offsets high cost of living. However, if you prefer to live offcampus in an apartment, be aware that costs, furnishings, and availability will vary greatly depending on location. Some towns have very little affordable student housing, and choosing this option can be risky as you may not find accommodations as quickly as expected and could incur very high hotel costs.

#### COMMUNITY COLLEGES

A community college is a twoyear school in which you can begin your university study. You can complete the first two years of your bachelor's degree at a community college and then transfer your credentials to a four-year university. This is extremely common in the USA. Community colleges offer lower tuition costs, smaller class sizes and more personal attention. Many community colleges also offer intensive English language programs.

pus varies widely depending upon the type of housing you find and the city you select. The United States is a large and economically diverse country, so cost of living is very different from place to place. Metropolitan cities are generally going to be more expensive.

#### BOOKS AND SUPPLIES:

Students in the USA buy their own text-books, notebooks, and other supplies. You can save a lot of money by buying used books. This can be done in your campus bookstore or online. We recommend www.efollet.com or www.amazon.com for used book bargains. At the end of your summer course, you may be able to sell your textbooks back to the bookstore or online to other students.

However, you may want to keep them so that you can continue your studies of the English language and American culture at home. Don't let your adventures abroad end at the conclusion of your program!

#### PERSONAL EXPENSES:

You will pay up to several hundred dollars a month for transportation, entertainment, and necessities like soap, toothpaste, and stamps. You will also pay for laundry and dry-cleaning. You can often find a self-service laundry (coin or debit card operated washers and dryers) in your residence hall or near the campus.

#### **Payment**

Students are not always required to register in advance for summer programs. At many schools, you can register and pay your tuition during the first week of classes. However, as an international student you should plan

ahead and reserve space in the course you want to attend by writing to the program office well in advance.

U.S. banks often delay payment of money that is transferred from foreign banks. Students should bring debit cards or have their money available in a checking account. Most programs accept credit cards. It is also a good idea to order a small amount of U.S. currency for your first few days in the USA to take care of immediate needs like a taxi or shuttle ride home from the airport. Be aware that you will also need large sums of money during the first few days of your program for things like rental deposits, textbooks, course fees, etc. Be prepared!

#### Financial Aid and Working in the USA

Financial aid is almost never available for summer study, even for U.S. students. Therefore, do not plan to finance even part of your summer experience through university scholarships.

You may be able to take out a private loan to cover the cost of summer study abroad, with your parents or someone else as a cosigner. It may seem like a lot of money to spend, but think of it as an investment in yourself and your future. Study abroad in the USA now, before the realities of student loans and full time work prohibit you from fulfilling your dreams of travel!

The U.S. Government regulates international student employment. International students are not allowed to work during the first academic year in the United States. You may be able to work at an on-campus job. Ask the schools you're interested in if these opportunities are available in the summer. Also, spouses of students on F visas (most students) may not work while they are in the U.S.

Once you have experienced the life-changing effects of study abroad you will probably want to return to the U.S. to study for a longer period of time. True appreciation of another culture and people often takes a year or longer. Intercultural immersion is a lifelong gift that you give yourself, and provides you with a special capacity for understanding other cultures that cannot be obtained anywhere else.

Another way to identify programs with high standards is to choose schools that are members of **EnglishUSA**. This organization was established for the sole purpose of setting standards for intensive English language programs. While EnglishUSA does not accredit programs, its members agree to follow standards of excellence established by the organization.


Finding an accredited English language program

The Commission on English Language Program Accreditation (CEA) is a specialized agency for the accreditation of English language programs and institutions in the United States. CEA accredits both English language programs in universities and colleges, as well as independent English language schools. Accreditation by CEA means that an English language program has met the CEA Standards for English Language Programs and Institutions. Programs that seek CEA accreditation must offer an intensive English program for non-native speakers of English, which meets at least 18 hours a week for at least 8 months a year.

Because CEA is a relatively new agency and the rigorous review process of schools may take months to complete, many programs have not yet completed the process to become accredited. Accredited programs may also indicate their CEA accreditation in their brochures, student packets, and advertisements. You can contact CEA directly:

Summer travel is especially popular among U.S. university students, who are typically on summer break from classes. With this time, they can travel to different parts of their own country. For international students summer is also a perfect time to travel, or it is a nice time to visit colleges, universities and English language programs.


It is a challenge for people from other regions to fathom the vastness of the United States—driving across the USA from New York to Seattle or L.A. would take days! The best part of travel in the U.S. is that each region of the country has its own geography, flavor and culture, much like the different countries of the E.U. or South America. This diversity makes it difficult to make generalities. Take advantage of your free time—travel and discover the USA!

international students want to work while they are studying in the United States to earn extra money and practice their English. This can sometimes be a difficult and complicated process, but advance preparation can increase your chances of finding a job. Understanding the rules you must follow and knowing where to go for help in your job search are the keys to success.

The United States issues different types of student visas, but most international students receive the F-1, a nonimmigrant visa for fulltime academic study. Because the F-1 visa is only for educational purposes, the U.S. government places restrictions on the employment options for F-1 holders. However, this does not mean that you cannot work if you have an F-1 visa. As long as you understand and follow the legal requirements, you can work on a student visa. Here are the most important rules for working in the United States on a student visa:

- 1. You must maintain full-time student status at all times.
- 2. You cannot work off campus during your

- first academic year of study. During that time, you are permitted to work on campus part-time (no more than 20 hours a week) while classes are in session.
- 3. After one academic year, you can work off campus in a position related to your field of study through the Curricular Practical Training (CPT) or Optional Practical Training (OPT) options.

These are not the only restrictions, and the office that issued your I-20 immigration document (usually the international student office at your school) is your best resource for understanding all the rules. Most international student orientation programs will provide information about employment options. Violating the laws may result in the loss of your student visa, so you must follow the directions of the international student advising staff at your school!

Now that you know the basic restrictions on employment for F-1 visa holders, where and how do you actually find a job? Universities in the United States often have a career development office that maintains an online database

of jobs and provides services such as career counseling, practice interviews, and resumewriting workshops to prepare you for the job application process. This is a great place to start your search. Many colleges also hold an on-campus job fair at the beginning of the semester, so you may find a part-time, on-campus position there. The campus bookstore, coffee shops, and other school-owned facilities often hire student employees at these events.

Graduate students have additional on-campus employment options; graduate assistantships in campus offices, as well as teaching and research assistantships, may also be available. Jinsun Baek, a former student of the University of Illinois at Chicago's (UIC) Tutorium in Intensive English, now works in the Tutorium's front office as a graduate assistant.

"Sometimes it's hard as a language learner to find a job on campus. It's important to be honest to yourself about your English proficiency, because you need to be able to compete with American candidates, who are typically native English speakers," says Baek.

However, other valuable qualities and workplace skills can help you overcome this potential obstacle. Through her enthusiasm and participation in program activities as a Tutorium student, Baek made a good impression on the school's staff, which helped her to get hired there.

To obtain off-campus jobs, you must get permission for CPT (Curricular Practical Training) or OPT (Optional Practical Training). If your degree program requires an internship, this position counts as CPT. Talk with your program director to find a position that fulfills the requirements, and file the necessary CPT paperwork with your university. After completing your degree, you can remain in the United States for an additional year to pursue OPT in your field of study. The international student office on your campus will help you to complete the required OPT paperwork.

Search in the community around you for opportunities as well. Networking will take you a long way—talk to other international students at your school, search Internet job databases, and contact the community of immigrants from your country if one exists in your area. Lexi Wang, a Chinese graduate student and research assistant at the Language and Culture Learning Center at the University of Illinois at Chicago, has some great advice for international students who hope to secure an

OPT position after graduation:

"Set up your network before you graduate from the college. You can talk to your professors and your friends ... as long as they refer you to a job, it's going to be so much easier than finding it on your own."

These people are great sources of information about existing and future job possibilities.

Many international students volunteer or intern at a non-profit organization while they are studying; sometimes these institutions can offer you a paying job once you graduate, and they are often willing to assist you in applying for the required immigrant work visa. If you speak a language other than English, consider working as a tutor or interpreter at an organization that serves immigrants in your community. Companies and organizations with an international focus often need employees who speak other languages and may be able to sponsor a work visa.

Over the course of her career, Eileen Censotti, the International Student Advisor at UIC's Tutorium in Intensive English, has met with many international students seeking work. She says that, although it can be challenging to find work when you are new to a country, being flexible and persistent in your job search will eventually result in success.

"If you don't find work right away, don't give up. Keep looking and applying to any job you think you can do," she advises.

Be resourceful and patient, and investigate all possible options during your employment search. Most people are happy to assist you if you reach out to them, so don't be shy about asking for help. Happy job hunting, and good luck!










# HOTEL TOURISM PROGRAMS BY Kelly Oto





and tourism is the world's largest industry. International hospitality management involves working with so many people and cultural layers that it has the power to help shape international relations—and change the world.

For you, this translates to a wonderful opportunity for a wide variety of exciting career selections. If hospitality and tourism is your chosen career, you should study in the United States. Here's why ...

#### A Model for Global Industry

Students from around the world come to this international hub of business and hospitality to learn and experience firsthand what customers want, need, and are going to demand in today's global economy. With the quality of customer service increasing the industry has become highly competitive. You need that professional edge to get your foot in the door. In the USA, hospitality training focuses on preparing students to become managers, rather than staff employees. Therefore, creative thinking and leadership is emphasized throughout the curriculum of a program.

#### **Culture**

It may surprise you that by studying and living in the United States you'll increase your knowledge not only of American culture, but of other foreign cultures as well. The U.S. is truly a melting pot. We come from many different backgrounds and this is reflected in our everyday living. Experiencing a diverse set of cultures is especially advantageous for those in the hospitality field as clientele is not isolated to one country.

By actually living in the United States you will be immersed with English speakers. Classes at most schools are taught in English by native speakers. #### **Flexibility**

It is not unusual for Americans to change their major or pursue more than one program simultaneously. Additionally, students often transfer from one educational institution to another. For example, as you progress in your studies at one school, learning more about the hospitality industry, you may discover a specific area of hospitality you want to pursue. This may motivate you to transfer to a different school that specializes in that area, or that is located near hotels and businesses offering internships that would be strategic to your career goals.

#### **Wide Choice of Programs**

In the past 30 years, the number of U.S. post-secondary institutions offering hospitality, travel and tourism programs have more than quadrupled. This has resulted in a wide variety of philosophies and approaches. Guest service is the common thread woven through all programs. While not all programs are available at every school, generally there are certain areas you may want to study: lodging, recreation, travel, tourism, convention, culinary, food and beverage, and casino.

As an international student, you will find that the U.S. educational system offers instruction in a broad range of subjects. Most likely you will take classes that fall into the liberal arts category, as well as courses specific to your program, such as Hotel and Restaurant Accounting, Resort Management or Ecotourism.

The University of California, Irvine (UCI) offers a three-month International Tourism & Hotel Management Certificate focusing on the growth of environmental consciousness within tourism. Using case studies, instructors help students grasp concepts and practices of successful hotel management that emphasizes sustainability and conserving natural resources. Throughout the program the students examine real-life cases that involve tourism infrastructure, super structure (for example, developing a new airport) and issues relating to pollution. They then determine how a tourism project will affect the local economy and the environment.

Instructors tailor the assignment to each student's country or city of origin, teaching students from overseas to learn to identify how some tourism issues relate to their home countries and the possible solutions they can apply. They then give a class presentation about their findings.

Project management and customer service skills are important aspects of the program. For example, the Customer Service class covers a variety of topics: delivering better, faster service; increasing customer satisfaction; learning how to gain repeat

business; finding workable solutions to customer problems; and motivating employees.

The Marketing and Branding class covers such timely topics as electronic resources, international competitive analyses and metrics for evaluation.

#### **Professors**

Faculty members come from a diverse set of professional backgrounds. While qualifications may differ, generally speaking, faculty members have at least a master's degree and extensive experience in the industry. They are dedicated, hard-working and genuinely care for their students.

#### **Employment Experience**

Many hospitality programs offer intensive training, cover a variety of subjects, and provide a special emphasis on customer service—something that many students find to be an invaluable component of their training. Credentials, or a degree from an American school are well respected around the world, and most important, many graduates find great success and mobility in their career.

Through internships and work experience programs, you will gain invaluable practical experience in your chosen field. Internships are an ideal way for you to develop your customer service skills and to learn how to handle unique situations. The best programs integrate both academic site visits and trips to local attractions into the curriculum. Along with learning the business aspects of hospitality management, you will gain the perspective of your future customers.

#### **Lasting Friendships**

Last, but certainly not least, is the opportunity you will have to make lifelong friendships. The other students you will meet and the friends you will make will, in many cases, be in your life long after you complete your studies.

Thanks to the diversity and variety of excellent programs like these, hospitality graduates from U.S. schools are working in the hotel and restaurant industry in nearly every country of the world.

#### **Test format**

The IELTS test assesses your abilities in listening, reading, writing and speaking - in less than three hours.

There are two types of the IELTS test: IELTS Academic and IELTS General Training. Listening and Speaking are the same for both tests, but the subject matter of the Reading and Writing components differs depending on which test you take.

The Listening, Reading and Writing components of all IELTS tests are completed on the same day, with no breaks in between them.

The Speaking component, however, can be completed up to a week before or after the other tests. Your test centre will advise.

The total test time is 2 hours and 45 minutes.




